#### 1. Introduction to indexes 1860-1891

#### (a) Scope of indexes

I prepared these indexes as preparation for an Open University research degree. The first two indexes - for 1860 and 1861 - were used to identify a suitable subject for my thesis and are comprehensive. See separate notes below for the <a href="scope">scope</a>, <a href="indexing">indexing</a> policy, arrangement and main headings used for these indexes.

The remaining indexes are more selective. As a subject emerged around the issues of property rights, copyright, competition and pricing in the mid-Victorian book trade I concentrated on identifying material relevant to these themes. I took 1866, 1871, 1881 and 1891 as sample years to give an idea of change over time; and selected 1891 as the last year, when the Chace Act was passed and British writers were able to obtain copyright in America.

As the emphasis of my work changed there were some variations in the headings used. I hope in future to produce a cumulative index on the subjects covered by my thesis for the period from 1858 to 1891. In the meantime, please be aware that the indexes offered here vary in coverage and the headings used are not entirely consistent.

The indexing reflects information as provided by *The Bookseller*. There is further work to be done correcting variations in the names of publications and people and indexing the content and years not so far covered. This is a work in progress. The intention here is to provide a tool for further research rather than a fully researched set of indexes in their own right.

# (b) References

References are to page numbers. I have used *The Bookseller's* copy of the British Library microfilm and the Bodleian Library hard copy. I am grateful to *The Bookseller* and Bodleian Library for access to these. The pagination in the early years of *The Bookseller* was often irregular. Please see the <u>note on irregular page numbers</u> for those which affect indexing references.

I am grateful to my tutors at the Open University, Professor Simon Eliot and Dr David McKitterick, for their comments on the indexes in the early years of my research and also to Simon Eliot for his encouragement and support in making these indexes publicly available.

## 2. Scope of The Bookseller and the indexes for 1860 and 1861

These indexes cover all sections of *The Bookseller*. They contain entries for regular features in *The Bookseller*; the names of traders and the places where they operate; subjects related to the book and publishing trade and general subjects; people prominent in the book and publishing trade; authors and titles of newsworthy books and books reviewed; and the titles of newspapers and periodicals. The following is a brief guide to the main sections of *The Bookseller* and how they have been indexed.

# 3. Indexing policy - 1860 and 1861

The following describes how the main types of heading have been used:

- (a) **Traders:** Entries have been included for every named publisher, bookseller or other trader who has done or is doing something newsworthy; who is announcing or advertising a new publication; who has placed any sort of trade advertisement; who has submitted an item for the books wanted section; or who is the subject of an obituary.
- (b) **Places:** Where there is a place given for the trader an entry is also included under the name of that place.
- (c) Foreign countries: Material relating to places in foreign countries has been grouped together under the name of the country rather than under the names of individual towns and cities.
- (d) **Subjects:** Fairly broad subject headings have been used to cover subjects relating to the book and publishing trade and more general subjects. *Book trade* has been used for general material on the

publishing and bookselling trades; Bookbinding trade, Newspaper trade, Paper trade, Periodical trade, services for and Printing trade for material relating specifically to those trades. Other terms have been used for aspects of the trade such as Employment, types of publication such as Periodicals, and related areas of interest such as Libraries. Because of the overlap in activities no attempt has been made to create distinct groupings of stationers, booksellers and publishers.

- (e) **Regular features:** Some headings have been created for regular features in *The Bookseller* such as *Books wanted* and regular features from *The London Gazette* such as *Bankruptcies*.
- (f) **Titles**: Title entries have been included for the names of newspapers, periodicals and books reviewed. Some title entries have also been created where there is significant information about a particular work in the literary gossip section; for works advertised where they are of particular interest to the book trade itself (such as bibliographical publications); for works which illustrate issues relating to the book trade (for example, expurgated publications); for works which are advertised particularly prominently and/or separately; and for works which in some way contain information that links with items in other parts of *The Bookseller* (such as the book reviews or literary gossip).
- (g) **Authors:** Entries are given for the principal author responsible for books reviewed when an author is given and for significant mentions of authors in the literary gossip section of the newspaper. Occasional entries for the authors of books advertised have been made according to the same criteria as for titles.
- (h) **Distinguished people, institutions, etc:** Entries have been created for significant mentions of people, institutions and bodies named in the trade news, literary gossip and other sections of *The Bookseller*.
- (i) **Cross-references**: See references have been used to bring together material on similar topics in one place, e.g. Botanical publications see Natural history publications. See also references have been used to provide links to related material, e.g. Authorship, see also Copyright and Plagiarism
- (j) Inconsistencies in The Bookseller: Where there are variations in the titles of publications, the spellings of people and companies, and other details such as addresses, entries have been merged only if there is clear evidence within The Bookseller that they are referring to the same person, publication or place and that one particular version is correct or preferred (e.g. entries for Elliott, Andrew of 15 Princes/Princes' Street, Edinburgh merged with entries for Elliot, Andrew of same address). Otherwise separate entries have been created for variant forms (e.g. separate entries retained for Simmonds, Thomas and Simmons, Thos.).
- (k) Incomplete information in *The Bookseller*: Particularly in the trade changes and literary gossip section of *The Bookseller* references to names of people, companies and publications are frequently incomplete (omitting forenames, partners and words from titles, for example). As with inconsistencies, entries are merged only if the accuracy of the identification and the correct form and details are clear (e.g. entries for Clark, Messrs of Edinburgh merged with entries for Clark, T. & T.). Otherwise, separate headings have been created (e.g. separate entries retained for Smart, Mr. (starting business at 9 Ave Maria Lane) and Smart, H.J. (giving address at 10 Ave Maria Lane)).

(1) Different emphases of information: Entries are created to reflect the emphasis of the material (e.g. authors and titles for book reviews, publishers' names for publishers' advertisements) but where different pieces of information about the same publication are given in different issues or different parts of *The Bookseller* some attempt has been made to bring such material together (e.g. an early reference to Mr. Jack's planning a heraldic work has been indexed under the author and title of the work despite neither being mentioned at that stage to keep the material on the publication together).

## 4. Arrangement of indexes for 1860 and 1861

Entries are arranged alphabetically word-by-word ignoring punctuation with entries for companies and then people without initials or forenames preceding the names of those with forenames or initials. Entries beginning St are placed as if spelt out in full (Saint), entries beginning Mac, Mc and M' are placed as if spelt Mac. Occasionally in headings, but more frequently in abstracts, a chronological sequence has been used instead of an alphabetical one where the stages or developments of a situation or process are more appropriate (e.g. proposals to abolish paper duties under Paper trade, duties, and state of trade in 1861).

## 6. Irregular page numbers in The Bookseller affecting index entries 1860-1891

There are frequent paging anomalies in the early years of *The Bookseller*. Here I list the main ones which I encountered during my indexing and research and which affect the use of the indexes. Please note:

- *The Bookseller*'s copy of the British Library's microfilm and the Bodleian Library's hard copy have been used. Where I have encountered variations between the microfilm and hard copy these have been noted but this is not a definitive list of all discrepancies between the two sources.
- Cover pages, which are not numbered, are not included here unless there are other anomalies. *The Bookseller* left spare numbers for these. The appropriate spare number has been used in the index references.
- There are a number of cases in the microfilm where pages have been duplicated. Again these have not been noted here.
- The final column shows the citation in the index. This may include my own explanation or a symbol such as an asterisk to reflect how it appears in *The Bookseller*.
- Only 1860 and 1861 have been indexed comprehensively. In the other years material has been indexed selectively. The list of irregularities for these years is not comprehensive but those encountered have been included regardless of whether they are cited in the index to aid finding references that are cited. Where an irregularity is not covered by references in the index it is marked as '(not cited in index)'.
