I suggest the following items for the agenda: -

- (1) The means whereby information as to Japanese activities in the Pacific Islands can best be obtained, collated and disseminated.
- (2) The defence of seaplane and other bases. likely scale of seaborne or air attack does not justify the installation of coast or anti-aircraft artillery in the Pacific Islands. It is also highly improbable that any British troops can be made available for defence against a landing. In the absence of efficient local forces (the raising of which may be impracticable in many places) defence, if considered essential, might be undertaken by Australia and New Nealand.
