These bundles have become necessarily correlated owing to the proposed Conference in New Zealand.

It may be convenient if I give briefly the summary of the present position.

As far as the Canton-Enderbury dispute is concerned the position is that a draft exchange of notes is under discussion with the United States Government. A telegram received a few days ago indicates that the draft prepared by us and presented to the United States Government is likely to be acceptable to them.

That file also deals with our apprehensions lest United States Government should again present us with the fait accompli by trying to seize some of the other islands in the area. A few months ago they informed

a hydrographical expedition to certain of these islands including Hull and weare apprehensive lest it should be part of a further move in that area. It now appears from recent telegrams that they have no such i must intentions, at least in regard to Hull. It was because of these apprehensions that we were anxious from the Colonial Office point of view to press on with a proposed Conference in New Zealand for the discussion of the general position in regard to these islands.

As far as the proposed Conference is concerned the position now is that a telegram has just gone from the Dominions Office to New Zealand dealing with the agendar in so far as defence was concerned, and saying that the Conference might take place in the middle of March. (There is a draft telegram 7025/2. on 6214/55 informing the High Commissioner of this.)

It is proposed that the Conference should consist of Sir Harry Batterbee, the High Commissioner of the United Kingdom in New Zealand and representatives of the New Zealand and representatives dovernments. It appears that it will be possible for Sir Harry Luke to attend this Conference without interfering with his plans for visiting the High
